Business backs work law

BUSINESS SA has thrown its support behind the State Government's controversial work safety legislation.

The Government is attempting to change occupational health and safety laws after a federal agreement to streamline arrangements across the states.

The proposed laws will put more responsibility on every member of an organisation to

concerned about the laws increasing compliance costs.

Peter Vaughan said the initial legislation "created enormous

uncertainty" as to who was ultimately responsible for safety outcomes in the workplace.

Industrial Relations Minister Russell Wortley, Mr Vaughan said changes had been made which meant Business SA could support the Bill.

Mr Wortley said recent changes agreed to with business gave "further clarity for employers to fully understand the extent of their responsibilities to protect workers from injuries. illness and fatalities".

The fate of the Bill is now likely to come down to the vote of MP John Darley.
